Bill Thomson and assistant coach, Arthur Grainge returned for another shot at glory with another veteran team and a few holes to fill. Award-winning and standout players like Mike Lanos, Ian Martin, John Vidovich, Sean Holmes, Armando Pleschard, John Roumelis, Andy Cuthill, Siva Ananmalay, and Marty Lauter were on this team as well as rookies Andy Nera, Paul Vidovich, Richard and David McFall, Alan MacVicar. Steve Aldrich and John Hemm also played among others in supporting roles. The goalkeepers were Jimmy Avegaros and Jimmy "Jazz" Armstrong. Jazz would eventually win the starting role after a few games. Steve Ball also made his first appearance in the program early in the season as a third-string goalkeeper.



The team would finish second in a very strong OUAA East division in which only the top two teams made the playoffs. They would lose only one regular season game all year but ran into a talented Wilfred Laurier team in the OUAA Semifinal, and lost 1-0. Laurier had also eliminated the Ravens at the same stage in their inaugural season (1982), 2-0. Sweeper and Co-Captain, Sean Holmes would score a Raven record 5 penalty kicks

during the season and added four more from play to tie Mike Lanos for the team lead with 9 goals. John Roumelis wasn't far behind with 8.

The Ravens had clinched a playoff spot in the final week with a fierce 2-1 battle over Laurentian. This was the fifth season in a row that the Ravens had advanced to the OUAA Provincial Final Four. Again, in these early years, only the top-two teams from the OUA East and West qualified and then played in a Final Four cross-over single elimination format to determine the OUAA Champion. You needed to win your provincial championship to have a chance at the national title during this era.



John Vidovich was named All-Canadian, joining Ian Martin and Mike Lanos in that exclusive club. At this time there was no Alumni Association as varsity soccer at Carleton was still in its infancy, having participated in just five CIAU seasons. Many of these graduating players went on to form the foundations of the early CSAA (Alumni Association). Women's soccer at Carleton began its first varsity season in 1986.
